Arts in Education

The BAAC has been sponsoring successful arts education programs in the Batesville Schools since 1988.

The goal of the BAAC Arts in Education Program is to enrich the educational experiences and lives of the students and teachers in the six area schools by bringing a variety of professional artists into the schools to integrate the arts into the existing school curricula. This arts-curricula integration allows students to have hands-on, three-dimensional experiences that involve all the senses, and create learning experiences students will long remember. To accomplish this, the BAAC provides generous funds for schools to bring in resident and visiting artists in many disciplines, such as art, music, theater, writing, and dance.

Batesville Primary School







- Two actors from the Bright Star Touring Theatre performed several of Aesop's Fables for BPS students. These fables included "The Ant and the Grasshopper," "The Dog and Its Bone," "The Town Mouse and the Country Mouse," and "The Fox and the Grapes."
- 2nd Grade students at Batesville Primary school created their own bowls out of plaster cloth. Visiting artist, Stacy Gray, taught the students the technique with a connection to art history. Students were happy to experience this medium for the first time.
- Children's book author Lester Laminack visited Batesville Primary School and entertained students by animatedly reading aloud several of his books. He also met with students, signed books, and took pictures with those students who brought books for him
- Two teaching artists from Playhouse in the Park led workshops for each of our kindergarten classes for 45 minutes each day during the five day school week. They read aloud and performed scenes from the Dr. Seuss book, "Green Eggs and Ham". First and second grade workshops also occured this past spring.

Batesville Intermediate School







- Robin McBride Scott hosted individual pottery workshops for all 5th grade classes in November. In the hour-long workshops, Robin taught the students about Native American pottery, its visual characteristics and functional features.
- Performing artists from Cincinnati's Playhouse in the Park joined each class in person for 40 minute workshops during the 5 day week. Each grade level had a different theme/unit of focus for the
- Actors from Bright Star Theater performed Holidays Around the World for 3rd, 4th and 5th graders in BHS's auditorium. Students "traveled" around the world and learned about different winter holidays like the Lohri Festival, St. Lucia Day, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, the Chinese New Year, Christmas and more.
- Iditarod musher, Karen Land came to Batesville Intermediate School to share her experience mushing in the world's longest dog-sled race. Students learned about the history or the race, how to prepare for the race and why it is so important.

Batesville Middle School









- Danyel Mann visited all of the BMS choirs and taught them custom choreography for their musical, Annie Jr. Adding choreography elevated the difficulty level of the production and improved coordination since students need to be able to sing and move at the same time.
- All 6th grade students attended a 50-minute presentation that reinforced the physical science standards that they had reviewed in class. The presenter, Michelle White, created a curriculum -based presentation based on our current standards.
- Dr. Mark Webb arranged a special version of the song "It's The Most Wonderful Time of the Year" for the Batesville Choirs to perform at their Winter Concert. Each choir had a part written specifically for them that was meant to highlight their skill levels and vocal ranges.
- IRT provided a link with a videotaped performance of the piece. Approximately half of the students attended the production in the morning while the other half attended a viewing in the afternoon. Students followed this up on Tuesday with a discussion of the similarities and differences in the piece.

Batesville High School











- Ja'Shon Burks has worked with the Batesville Singers for several years now. He is a very skilled choreographer and challenges the students by making the choreography more difficult each year. The entire competition show was learned in two weekends and the students were able to run all of their choreography with him on the last day.
- Dr. Mark Webb also visited the High School choirs. Dr. Webb came to visit each choir and work with them on the custom arrangement he wrote. Being able to work with such a talented clinician definitely improved the overall performance of the song at their Winter Concert.
- Jimmy Rowland came to visit Mr. Hunteman's digital design classes again this school year. He prepared an art lesson on logo designs through Adobe Illustrator. Students were tasked with taking pixelated logos and transforming them into crisp vector images for quality printing. Students had to take the existing Twitter logo and redesign it with their own creative twist. They took their initials and designed multiple personalized logos. Jimmy shared his process and showed students multiple techniques and helpful tips within the software.
- -Danyel Mann also stopped by the Batesville High Drama Club to create the choreophy for their musical The Sound of Music. While at the school she created the choreophy for five dance numbers.

St. Louis School





- Miss Lizzie came to St. Louis and spent three days working with St. Louis students. She taught them about the history and the origin of ballet .They learned that ballet originated in France under King Louis and she explained that is why many of the ballet terms are French. She showed them the different types of shoes used in dance and how strong ballerinas have to be when going up on their tiptoes and point shoes. Many commented that they gained a new appreciation for how hard and strenuous dance could be,especially since it looks so effortless when watching a professional ballerina.

St. Louis School continued



- The fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth graders at St. Louis Catholic School were able to experience a Latin American dance workshop in April. Laura Ault and Mayra Adams taught students a variety of latin dances including merengue, salsa, cumbia, and cha cha cha. Each dance included a variety of movements which were then combined together into a dance routine set to music from each dance genre.

Oldenburg Academy









- To wrap up their unit on The Great Gatsby, Ms. Yane's American Literature class had a Gatsby party. Students dressed in period costume (both from our drama department's prop room and students' personal acquisitions), enjoyed a festive dinner with foods mentioned in the novel, and learned the Charleston Dance from dance instructor Laura Ault.
- Oldenburg Academy hosted Matthew Taylor, a magician, in January. Taylor's theme for the performance was trash and the idea of "reduce, reuse, recycle." OA students focused on the Franciscan value of "caring for creation" this year, so the performance was a way to merge that value with some entertainment.
- Matthew Graham, Indiana's Poet Laureate, visited the AP Literature class in April. Graham read some poems from his most recent book, The Geography of Home. He talked about inspiration for writing poetry -- capturing moments, feelings, and images. He also told the students that poetry was "about getting as much out of language as possible."


